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A MESSAGE FROM GCFP PRESIDENT LEEANNA RYBA

I am happy to report that the state of Pennsylvania, "Penns Woods," is in its

most splendid fall foliage. The Laurel Highlands and the Poconos look like a bowl of Trix cereal! The October Garden Club Federation of Pennsylvania Board (GCFP) Meeting was held on October 7-8 in Boalsburg, PA. Boalsburg, outside of State College, is a beautiful place nestled in the Allegheny Mountains. The Wyndham Garden Hotel was chosen because of



its central location. Members accepting Board positions are asked to attend two Board Meetings annually and the State Convention. For the past year, the sleeping room count has not been met. This causes the GCFP to bear the expense of the meeting rooms. More than that, it implies a lack of interest. Board meetings are an opportunity to learn about the many worthy projects our GCFP clubs are involved in and to network with garden club members statewide in a more casual atmosphere. I would like to see an increase in attendance during the next administration.

Many GCFP garden clubs have traditionally donated to the **NGC Penny Pines Program.** Donations are either budgeted or memorial donations. Since the Allegheny National Forest is located in PA, all funds donated stay within our state. I think this is one reason many clubs support Penny Pines. Recently, the U.S. Forestry Dept. has changed the manner in which they accept donations. Our State Chair has spent days on the phone, sent multiple notarized forms, and had to deal with the GSA to allow the GCFP to set up contracts to donate our funds. The current process will undoubtedly cause a change in the way the GCFP handles Penny Pines, now called "Plant A Tree," donations in the future. I highly commend Barbara Andrus, my Penny Pines Chair, for her tenacity and patience shown in this position.

Thirteen GCFP scholarships are awarded to college/graduate students every year. Students do not have to be enrolled in PA institutions of higher learning, but many are. Applications must be sponsored by a GCFP garden club. The GCFP scholarship fund is supported by donations. This year District X issued a challenge to the other nine districts by making a \$1,000 donation and challenging the other districts to do likewise. So far, District VII has responded with another \$1,000 donation. I would like to commend District X and Past District Director, Deb Davis, for thinking outside the box.

As the time I am President of the Garden Club Federation of PA is winding down, I am extremely proud of the many diverse and beneficial projects "my" clubs are undertaking. Clearly, the Covid hiatus has ended, and PA is busy "Planting America, While Keeping PA Beautiful."

BLUE/GOLD STAR MARKER

The first Gold Star Memorial Marker dedication at Patriot Park on August 12 was outstanding. Somerset Garden Club cooperated with The Patriot Park Foundation to erect the marker at the park's entrance in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Behind it are over 7,000 small American flags that represent the service men or women who have lost their lives in the Global War on Terrorism.



Patriot Park is about four miles from the Flight 93
Memorial. The Musser family donated the property
for the park in honor of these Patriots. Initially,
Randy Musser and his volunteers hand set each
flag in the spring and removed them after Veteran's
Day, but high school students now assist with the
effort. This year, educational display boards are
lining the entrance to the park, and more are
planned.



Last June, **Somerset Garden Club** dedicated a **Blue Star By-Way Marker** near the new Gold Star Marker. Randy's wife, Linda, is a member and past president of Somerset Garden Club.



On September 8, a **Blue Star By-Way Marker** was dedicated at the Venango County Veterans Administration Clinic in Franklin, PA. This was sponsored and paid for by the **Franklin Gardeners Association** in cooperation with **Oil City Garden Club**.

We ordered two additional Highway Markers from Sewah. In August, **Stacey Ivol**, the newly installed District IX Director, and I went to Mercer to view our first **Gold Star Highway Marker** that had recently been received at the PENNDOT headquarters. This marker will be dedicated in May 2025, following the renovations of the **Welcome Center at Mercer**, **PA**, on Interstate 80.

District X is sponsoring the Washington, I-70 Eastbound Welcome Center Marker at the West Virginia/PA border at Claysville, on the western side of the state.

District IV ordered a Blue Star Highway Marker to be placed in **Franklin County**, **at I-81 Northbound**, 1.5 miles from the PA/MD Border. Thanks to these three districts, there will be a new marker at Welcome Centers on our **western and southern borders**.

The committee's immediate goal is to secure a sponsor for the Fulton I-70 Westbound at the PA/MD border near Warfordsburg. We will soon ask the districts near the Delaware Water Gap, I-80 West and Northampton, I-78 near Easton to consider helping the Blue Star Program to finish lining the Pennsylvania Welcome Centers. There are 116 markers already dedicated and/or on order. An updated listing will be posted on the website soon.

There were also a few changes made to the Awards Manual, so be sure to read the "Changes to the Awards Manual" document on the website, and make note of the necessary changes in your printed copy of the manual. Some date changes are: Laurels, Perennial Bloom, Publicity Press Book, and Youth Yearbook Award, so check out the document for those dates and all of the other manual changes.

NGC has discontinued the Social Media Pages Award beginning this year (NGC Manual Page 34).

The Governor's Trophy eligibility this year is for Medium Clubs 21-50 members. The **Book of Evidence** for this award is due by January 15 (Page 19 of the <u>GCFP Awards Manual</u>).

YOUTH ACTIVITIES

National Garden Clubs announced the new theme for the Youth 2024-2025 Poetry Contest -- "My Garden Has Vegetables To Share That I Can Spare." Children may use different types of poetry to tell others about vegetables seen in gardens that can be shared to help fight hunger and food insecurity.

The theme should be used throughout the poem, but **NOT** as the title. If the title is the theme, it will be disqualified. Writing the poem should be a class assignment for Kindergarten through Grade 12, so there is no help from family members, assuring the original work of the student.

The garden clubs initially judging children's entries are asked not to forward dark or dismal entries to the Youth Co-Chairs because they will be disqualified.

The Youth Sculpture Contest is for children in Grades 4 - 8, who work on items created by recyclable, reused or reduced materials that can fit on an 8 1/2 x 11" sheet of paper. Two 4 x 6" photos of the items should be attached to the back of an application form found on the NGC website under "Youth & Scholarships > Contests and Activities."

The Essay Contest is for high school students in Grades 9 - 12, and again, should be a class assignment, so that there is no influence from family members, assuring the original work of the student. The theme and the title of the essay is "Should Edible Insects be Harvested as a Food Source From Our Gardens?" It must be 500-600 words long and will be penalized if it doesn't conform to requirements. Use spell check, no runon sentences, and cite sources.

The **rules** regarding 2024-25 Poetry Contest, Youth Sculpture, and High School Essay Contest can be found on the <u>NGC website</u>. **Mail hard copies** by Monday, December 2, 2024, to Chris Hawthorne. It is important for entries to be typed and legible, with accurate student names, grades, and sponsoring club names. Any illegible entries will be discarded.

As Books of Evidence are prepared for flower show awards, note that a digital copy of the Book of Evidence is now required by NGC to apply for an award. The file can be delivered on a flash drive or can be emailed. Everything that would have been included in a book MUST be in the file. This includes the applications and a digital copy of the schedule.

If the digital record is to be returned, please include return postage. Most flower shows are held summer into fall, but those having a holiday show in November or December should contact me directly about book submission.

The deadline for submitting a **Book of Evidence** is **December 1**, **2024**, but I am willing to work with those in a time crunch. I hope that flower show chairs try to reward their club and committee's work by applying for a **Flower Show Achievement Award**.

Due to NGC's request that all Flower Show Books of Evidence be in digital form, the State Judge's Council has changed the Flower Show Evaluation procedure. Please send a paper copy of your evaluation to Mary Jane Martucci as before. Also, send a digital copy of your evaluation to Deb Stumpf - logansmimi56@yahoo.com

This can be done two ways. You can scan your paper copy into your computer and email it or you can use the fillable form on the GCFP website and email that. If there are no digital evaluations for a book I receive, I will be forced to disqualify the book of evidence.

I hope all of our judges can work together to make this system work.

"Have you heard about rain gardens?" Rain gardens are bowl-shaped gardens designed to capture rainwater from hard surfaces such as roofs and roads. These gardens are cultivated with beautiful **native plants** featuring flowers of purple, yellow, red, and white. The plants have deep root systems, creating channels for rainwater to easily soak into the ground.

Native plants provide **food and shelter** for a variety of local and migrating birds, butterflies, insects and pollinators. Rain gardens can help to protect our streams and rivers from **pollution** and **flooding**.

PRC and their partners forged an **initiative** to create rain gardens for public demonstration on public and private property with the vision of accelerating the adoption of green stormwater infrastructure. More information can be found on the PRC website.

FOUR AND FIVE STAR MEMBERSHIP

National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC) offers **four schools** for the educational growth of its members. Schools offered are Environmental (ES), Gardening (GS), Landscape Design (LDS), and Flower Show (FS). Upon full completion of course requirements in any one school, a member attains the status of Consultant, or in the case of Flower Show School, Flower Show Judge.

The **Four Star Program** encourages garden club members to complete all four NGC Schools and achieve Consultant/Flower Show Judge status in each. To maintain their Consultant "Good Standing" accreditation status, these graduates refresh in an ES, GS and LDS course at least once every five years. Alternatively, these graduates may attend a Tri-Refresher or Multiple Refresher for credits.

For example, if Sally is a Consultant in Gardening and Environmental, she can refresh at a Tri-Refresher for only one of the schools. FS Judges must attend a Symposium and attain exhibiting and judging credits once every three years.

(Note that <u>anyone</u> interested in expanding their knowledge may attend NGC School courses, Symposiums and Tri-Refreshers.).

Upon completion of four refresher credits in each school earned as often as once in a calendar year, one becomes a Master Consultant in each, as required in the **Five Star Program.**

The **Five Star Program** encourages Four Star Program members to continue their education and pursue a higher level of learning and skills by achieving a Master Status in each of the four NGC Schools.

Similar to the Four Star Program, Master accreditation requires one course refresher at least every five years in each ES, GS and LDS School and every three years for FS School. A Master Consultant can receive credit in those schools for which he/she is already a Master Consultant. For example, if Sally is a Master Consultant in Gardening and Environmental, she is able to refresh for both at a Tri-Refresher.

NGC establishes the content of **four sequenced courses** comprising a series for each of the four schools:

- Each course consists of **ten hours of instruction**, including any field trips and tours.
- Exams are offered for accreditation in each school.
- One becomes a Provisional Consultant after passing two courses in each school and may join a Consultants Council.
- Members completing all four courses become
 Consultants among NGC members, a special
 achievement, but it does not convey professional
 status. They may judge contests and displays as
 representatives of the ES, GS and LDS Schools in
 events.

FROM PENNY PINES TO PLANT-A-TREE

Most are familiar with this program for national forests called Penny Pines. The new name "Plant-A-Tree" better reflects the program's mission and will help us reach a wider audience. National Garden Clubs is making changes to the donation process to make it more accessible and user-friendly. Even if you are already familiar with the original Penny Pines program, please read through the changes below.

DONATION AMOUNT - Previously, we required donations in increments of \$68. Donors can now contribute any amount, starting from as little as \$50 to as large as \$10,000. This change provides greater flexibility for donors and enables a wider range of people to participate in the program.

CERTIFICATES – As of May 31, 2025, NGC will no longer provide mailed certificates to donors. In an effort to "Go Green," we will offer digital certificates that donors can customize and print out. We kindly ask that all donors provide their email address (even if donating by check) so that we can electronically send out tax receipts and online certificate link instructions. We assure that your privacy and personal information will be handled with the utmost care and security.

DONATIONS TO SPECIFIED FORESTS – You may designate to have your donation go to a specific National Forest; however, the Forest Service reserves the right to utilize funds based on need. If you specify a National Forest where there is no tree planting need, then the donation may be used for planting trees in another forest. Please note that individual plantings will not be identified per donor.

Thank you for your support and dedication to our reforestation efforts. A \$50 minimum is required with each donation.
